

Dear Friends


Welcome to our Reflective Service for Holy Week and Easter 2023.

volunteered at Samaritans once a week, and had driving lessons for my skill. I also did some extra practice cycles as my 'physical' to help me train for my Expedition.



Ukraine Update

The war in Ukraine has now been going on for over a year. The global Baptist family has responded with overwhelming generosity to the largest displacement of people in Europe since World War II, making this the largest Baptist aid response perhaps in our history as a Christian group. Conservatively, at least 612,445 people have received aid, hospitality, and care in and around Ukraine. The EBF

staff can only offer our deepest gratitude both to our Baptist family around the world and to the God who was able to do immeasurably more than we could ever imagine.....Despite the pain and suffering of the last year, God's mercy and grace has shown through at every moment. Through the faithful, caring witness of Baptists in Ukraine, over 3,000 people have been baptised



Despite power outages limiting communications, Ukrainian Baptists organised churches to become centres of Heat and Hope. Through distributing 221 generators and gifts of fuel, churches were able to open up their doors to those during the winter months and provided spaces of reprieve from the cold and from the war. Further, the union has

helped financially support 460 pastors in the winter to enable them to stay in their local communities and serve those in need.

£5775 was sent to Christian Aid who are part of the DEC Emergency Appeal. Thousands of people have died, with many more injured in

Jesus Christ you are risen, and we see you,


In the weakness of the vulnerable,
